## ENDING HOMELESSNESS – Australian Alliance to End Homelessness Agenda

The scale of homelessness in Australia is both preventable and solvable. Homelessness is a systemic problem involving numerous sectors, institutions and agencies and requires joined up policies and better integrated systems. *The growing scholarly and practitioner movement towards systems integration thus refers to strategies and frameworks to improve collaboration and coordination between people, organizations and sectors that touch upon homelessness, including some that may not conceive of themselves as directly related to the issue.* (Nichols and Doberstein, 2016) It is our belief that we could end homelessness in Australia by building a system whereby any individuals, women and children, and families who experience homelessness for any reason it should be rare brief and non-reoccurring.

## 1. Homelessness – early intervention

Prevention of homelessness is key; however this is done nationally through addressing poverty, unemployment and housing systems.

Early intervention is addressed by promoting a more integrated system response. Through improved federal and state policy and programs and by implementing local systems that are informed by up-to-date data

- 1.1 Working with communities to gather and use data for planning and collaborative investment across human services, health and housing to access and sustain tenancies for those who require ongoing support.
- 1.2 Promote a coordinated entry system in local communities to enable access appropriate affordable and safe housing with the right mix of services onsite, through mobile outreach and mainstream services.
- 1.3 Ensure joined up systems with access to housing with women and children experiencing domestic violence, people experiencing mental illness, disability and addictions, chronic illness, post release prisons and correctional centers.
- 1.4 Rapid re-housing and Housing First need to become 'business as usual' responses to ensure the experience of homelessness is rare, brief and non-recurring.
